
Snowboarding (2.5. 2012, Inawashiro town)

Shinobu Sanzan Akimairi Festival (2.10. 2012, Fukushima city)

This festival started nearly 300 years ago when people believed that the gigantic "waraji" (a type of traditional straw sandal) would bring good luck so they placed it in Haguro shrine on Mt. Shinobu and prayed for abundant harvest and the safety of one's family. This year too, people carried the gigantic "waraji" around the city and to the shrine.

I have a feeling that a new way of life is ready to begin.

Satou Jun (Male, Fukushima city)

I am currently a sophomore in Fukushima University. After the earthquake, I went back to Saitama prefecture and stayed for a while as it was also spring break. I came back to Fukushima prefecture in May as school was about to resume. Many things came to my mind after the quake and one of them is to act quickly and make the right decisions. In the past, I would always think too much before I took any actions and I thought it was not very effective. Therefore, my theory now is that I will take actions before I think too much. In addition, although I have never thought about what I can do for Fukushima, I want to make an effort to help this prefecture. At the moment, in cooperation with local companies, we are planning a relay event in hope to revitalize Fukushima prefecture.
