

It is now four years since the earthquake, various commemorations were held throughout the prefecture. Revitalization is in process as the Joban highway was open on March 1st and *Fukushima Destination Campaign* will be held in April. On the other hand, problems related to constructing the interim storage facility remain prominent. And until this day, there still are about 120,000 people evacuating away from their homes unable to return, despite some have come back slowly.

At Fukushima International Association (FIA), we started to provide free papers like *Gyro post-disaster edition* and *United We Stand Fukushima* after the earthquake. We hope to convey the current state of Fukushima and our local internationalization to more people.

Revitalization shopping district Toyo-Marche

In January, the "Revitalization shopping district *Toyo-marche* has opened 4 stores such as restaurants and fish markets at Iwaki Taira Toyoma area.

Toyoma area was one of the place hit the most by the tsunami after the East Japan earthquake. Process of revitalization and area division arrangement are going smooth; the public shelter was established in October. Many people have returned three years post the disaster and have already visited *Toyo-Marche*. Fukushima University students created a booklet called Toyo-Map, prefecture special products and revitalization plans to appeal the local allure.

Emergency announcement CD for Foreign-born residents

FIA produced emergency CDs in both English and Mandarin to broadcast during natural disasters for people who don't know Japanese well. The press conference about the CDs was held on Thursday, the 5th in March.

The CD content is divided into two parts: the first announcement targets at the time immediately following an earthquake, and the second announcement is for a few days later. FIA will send the data to various radio and TV stations in the prefecture, media facilities and government-related places should future emergent accidents occur.

Measurement of the radiation level in Fukushima city was taken in the parking lot on the north side of the Kenpoku District Health and Welfare Office, Koriyama city was taken in the parking lot on the south side of the Koriyama government office complex, the other cities and town were taken in the parking lot on the every joint government offices.
